- We plan that during this meeting the executive boards of both the AFCC and AFBC would hold a joint meeting.


Furthermore, there is ongoing discussion for active participation of American Association, European Federation and IFCC at this meeting.

MEMBERSHIP DRIVE

At present the membership comprises of 15 out of 54 countries in Africa and all the countries in Africa need support of IFCC.

Since the current executive came on board the funding of AFCC has improved through the commendable effort of the President, Professor Rajiv Erasmus who was able to secure grants from some companies which has helped to improve the activities of the federation.

Before this time our only source of funding was IFCC. The executive board plan to use three strategies to further raise fund in the coming year: these include trainings in molecular diagnostics, laboratory statistics and scientific writings all of these will require assistance of IFCC. We have challenged members to bring forward ideas for improve the fund raising drives of the AFCC.

STRATEGIC PLAN

We have not been able to put in place strategic plan due to logistic problems. However, at the beginning of this year we put up ten bullet points action plan . I am happy to report that 80% of the content of action plan for the year had been realised.



Many members of the Kenyan Association of Clinical Chemists and academic staff from : University of Nairobi, Maseno University and Aga Khan University benefited from the workshop.


During the workshop potential areas of research specifically directed at Clinical Audits were identified.

EXTERNAL QUALITY ASSESSMEN

On behalf of ACCN as part of follow up on the discussions on quality at 2016 conference in Nigeria by IFCC, the national representative Dr Soriyan wrote application to Birmingham for support to run EQA samples in 4 laboratories in Nigeria.

I am happy to report that the 4 laboratories have so far performed reasonably well with regard to monthly uploading of results of the analytes.

The process is still ongoing and the results are promising. We hope to request for greater support to spread across countries in West Africa and this will help us to activate activities in such countries.
